The program has access to professional counselling and psychological services which continue to assist racing participants that are in need of further support.

Buckley has been point of contact for many young jockeys seeking support which made him a natural fit to become a Racing Mates Ambassador.

"For the last 6 months, particularly, a lot of young riders have been coming up to me asking for help," Buckley said. "I'm glad to be involved with these sorts of things as its quite close to my heart.

"I've seen people go through some tough times and it's a pleasure that I can help people in the industry. My message for everyone in the industry is that it's OK to talk."

Lead Ambassador Pat Webster welcomed Buckley's addition to Racing Mates.

"Grant gains a lot of respect from his fellow riders and has long been a 'go to' person for many that have needed to talk to someone," Webster said. "We are pleased to have Grant on board as a Racing Mates Ambassador."
